



Stamp Booklets

Although there has been steady collector demand for stamp booklets, in the absence of discernible postal need they have not been introduced. It is recognised now, however, that there might be appreciable benefit to the postal service if those users who buy stamps one at a time could be persuaded to purchase in larger quantity, and to encourage change in that direction a stamp booklet is planned to be introduced with the Ham Radio stamp issue in April, to contain ten 43¢ stamps and to sell for \$4.30.







The four stamps will be -

- 45¢ French Navy patrol vessel "La Dunkerquoise". A number of vessels of this class, based at Noumea in New Caledonia, have been frequent visitors over the year. These ships were originally Canadian "Bay" class minesweepers.
- 50¢ Russian Research Vessel "Dmitri Mendeleev". The 1970's saw Norfolk Island visited by three Russian Research Vessels, "Vitiaz", "Dmitri Mendeleev" and "Kallisto". Of these, "Dmitri Mendeleev" was the only one built specifically for the purpose.
- 65¢ Tanker "Pacific Rover". Petrol and diesel fuel is brought in by tanker from Fiji, usually by this

vessel, and discharged into holding tanks at Ball Bay on the east side of Norfolk Island.

\$5.00 - HMAS Whyalla. Norfolk Island has no berthing facilities for ships of any size. On 28 July 1987 however, HMAS Whyalla, a "Fremantle" class patrol vessel of the Royal Australian Navy, brought in a distressed yacht "Heather Maria", and then being in need of re-fuelling, made local history by securing to Cascade jetty and taking on oil from the Island's road tanker.

(NOTE The Australian Government's announced intention of dispensing with 1¢ and 2¢ coins has made it necessary to revise the remaining parts of this stamp series. Part III (13 Aug 1991) will comprise 75¢, 80¢, 90¢ \$1.00. There will be probably be no Part IV.)

These three stamps show Norfolk Island and its global and regional location, and list the call-signs of Norfolk's five current ham radio operators.
