Featuring 2014 Year Book, 225th Anniversary of the Wrecking of the Sirius & Centenary of Landing of Gallipoli

Welcome to our first bulletin for 2015,

The Wrecking, Recovery of Artefacts, and the Artefacts themselves are the theme for this issue.

A Baltic trading ship, the Berwick had made several voyages to America before being recommissioned as the 20 gun "HMS Sirius" to be the principal naval consort to escort The First Fleet to Australia 1787-88. She was required to carry personnel for the penal settlement and her share of provisions and stores for Botany Bay.

That role accomplished the "HMS Sirius" flagship of the First Fleet assumed the mantle of protector and provider to the infant colony until her wrecking on the reef at Norfolk Island on 19 March 1790.

Wrecking

John Hunter, Captain of the "HMS Sirius", records in his journal "she came up almost head to Wind & there hung back sometime, but by her sails being all aback had fresh stern way, the Anchor was therefore Cutt away, and all the halyards sheets and tacks let go, but before the cable could be brought to Check her, she struck coral reef of Coral rock which lays parallel to the Shore & in a few Strokes was bulged".

The loss of the "HMS Sirius" was devastating as it was the only real means of contact with the rest of the world for the fledgling settlements on Norfolk Island and Port Jackson.

On Norfolk Island, the ramifications were immediate and serious with an overnight doubling of mouths to feed with no additional provisions.

Governor Phillip, (who was in Port Jackson), gave serious thought to closing both of the Norfolk and Port Jackson Settlements.



STAMP ISSUES

Recovery

Official expeditions to recover artefacts from the "HMS Sirius" wreck site were conducted between 1983 and 2002. In the lead up to the 200th Anniversary of the landing of the First Fleet in 1788 the "Sirius project" began to investigate the remains of the fleet's flagship. Five official expeditions recovered over 3,000 objects from the Sirius wreck site.

Artefacts

As a result of these expeditions many artefacts from the "HMS Sirius", are now available for all to see and are the most significant array of First Fleet cultural material and as such they hold national significance. This collection can be seen at the dedicated "HMS Sirius Museum", Norfolk Island.









Pictured on the First Day Cover is a composite of 2 paintings by two Survivors.

The image on the left hand side is by Midshipman George Raper whilst the painting on the right hand side is by Lieutenant William Barry of the Sirius, showing the Sirius failing to clear the bay.





1915-2015 Centenary of Norfolk Islanders landing at Gallipoli

The small Norfolk Island (NI), community had the highest head of enlistment per ratio in the Commonwealth. Despite difficulty with transportation to and from NI nine men departed for the Boer War, 81 of a possible 160 men joined the Australian and New Zealand military for WWI, 280 of a possible 365 men plus eight women joined the Australian and New Zealand military for WWII, our Islanders continued participation with Korea, Malaya, Vietnam, Gulf, Kuwait, Somalia, Afghanistan, East Timor, and other United Nations peace keeping forces.

Our NI population dealt with the resulting casualties of war, the prisoners of war, the missing in war, the injuries from war, and adjustment disorders. NI detached military personnel were decorated and the NI Infantry Detachment assigned to protecting its shores are mentioned and recognised for appropriate military service, we are indebted to these men and women who fought for the freedom we have today.

On 25th April 1915, 5 men from NI landed at Gallipoli between 0730 and 0900 hrs, and in the following days and months another 11 men from NI also landed and served at Gallipoli.

Initially a large wooden plaque recorded the Roll of Honour and the first ANZAC Day service was held on 25.4.1921 with most of the Island attending.

The War Memorial/Cenotaph featured on this Souvenir Sheet was unveiled on ANZAC day in 1929 by the Administrator H.S, Edgar.

There are 13 pines planted from the Cenotaph along Pier Street, one for each young life lost during the war. Not all of these pines remain, however, the names of the fallen can be seen on this Cenotaph.
