Sharks

As we are located in the vast South Pacific Ocean, it is a common occurrence to see sharks in our waters. A wide variety of species have been identified in Norfolk's waters, due to the Tropical Convergence, which is the boundary between tropical and cooler waters. this convergence moves up and down past Norfolk depending on the season, and the sharks move with the water temperature.

Only 4 species have been chosen for this issue. these magnificent fish make a great subject for a stamp issue and Mary Butterfield's beautiful artwork shows them off nicely.

Spiders of Norfolk Island

Norfolk Island has lots of spiders, however, potential visitors need not worry, because the spiders we feature rarely venture inside houses or buildings. three of the species featured are relatively large spiders that make huge webs between trees or power lines. they remain quite motionless and are generally considered harmless. visitors find them quite intriguing, especially the Community spiders in their huge misty webs.

The process of identifying these spiders for this issue was very interesting, as only limited study has ever been made of our spiders, in fact, one has not been properly described as yet. spiders are such an interesting animal, they are so diverse and have adapted to most environments on the planet. as with most spiders, of the ones featured the females are large and the males are tiny and vulnerable.

This new issue is one I have wanted to complete for some time. It illustrates the method of unloading the ships that ply between Norfolk Island, Australia and New Zealand. We can expect a ship every 2-3 weeks, either from New Zealand or Australia. Each ship brings approximately 500 tons, mostly food items and building material.

Ships moor approximately 1 kilometre off shore, due to the island not having a harbour. Small, unpowered lighters are towed back and forward carrying the cargo, which is loaded and unloaded using cranes. As can be imagined at times the job can become quite precarious due to rough seas and heavy dangerous cargo. Everything is brought in this way including buses, bulldozers, cars, timber and Rice Bubbles. It is a major tourist attraction for those visitors who are fortunate to be visiting when the ship arrives.

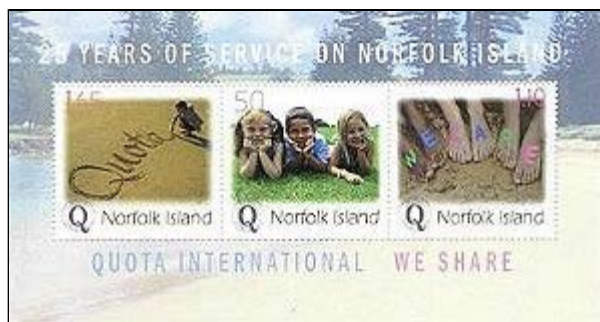

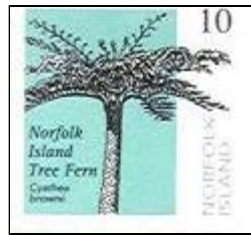
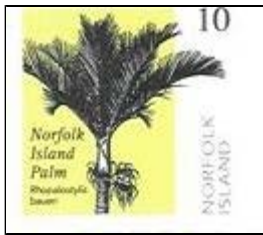
New Local Stamps

The Postal Service will release a new Local Postage Booklet on 28/09/04. The Booklet will contain 20 stamps, made up of two sheetlets of 10 stamps. The stamps feature illustrations of two native plants - the palm and tree fern.

This is the first of these local stamps for several years. It is difficult to believe that over 250,000 local postage items are handled each year - which amounts to a lot of "bills". This simple, locally produced stamp, is a concept unique to Norfolk Island.

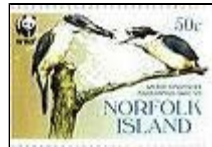

World Wildlife Fund for Nature

Norfolk Island has once again been invited to join the WWF for Nature to produce a stamp issue featuring an endangered native bird - the Sacred Kingfisher. This beautiful small bird, once quite common, has declined in numbers over the years, due to competition for nesting sites by introduced birds and loss of its natural habitat.

WWF has collaborated with Crown Agents to produce this very attractive issue on our behalf, which will be sold to many thousands of collectors of WWF material, who do not normally collect Norfolk's stamps.

This includes finances, immigration, quarantine, justice, health and education as well as the usual local government responsibilities of roads, waste management and planning. While the Budgets and size of the population the Norfolk Island Government deals with, is tiny compared to the other jurisdictions in Australia, it does have a wider range of responsibilities.
